They sweep the area clean with a broomstick, sprinkle water, and use rice flour/powder to draw beautiful designs called *kolam*.





Game: Qileblebosh ቅልብልቦሽ (with 5 stones)

How to Play:

- The game begins with the 5 stones on the ground. You pick up one stone and throw it in
 the air. As it comes down, you have to quickly pick up another stone from the ground
 and catch the stone thrown in the air.
- Now with two stones in your hand, you throw one of them into the air and grab another stone from the ground, until all 5 stones are in your hand.

You can imagine and create your own math questions and puzzles when you play games.

When you play <u>Qileblebosh</u>, if you catch 1 stone in the 1st round, 2 stones in the 2nd round, 3 stones in the 3rd round, 4 stones in the 4th round, and so on... until you have 10 stones in the 10th round, how many stones will you collect at the end of 10 rounds?

How did you solve the problem? What strategy did you use? Do you see any cool patterns in the numbers you have to add that make it easier, elegant, or more fun to add them? Math is all about patterns!


